Heaven has at last revived us with a little rain for a couple of days in succession. I have received your few lines,¹ and it was all thought out most economically, as you wrote little on the first side, but absolutely nothing on the second side, [5] for so many 1000s of characters could weigh a letter down so much that it would have to be pulled to Milan with 6 horses. Heavens! What expense! Blank paper is always cheaper to transport than that with writing on it. I will reply directly to my brother in Augspurg.² I will not get very involved in their insignificant dealings. We now have [10] our heads full with other matters, since the poetry³ has arrived late and remained in the hands of the poet⁴ for changes to this and that until 2 days ago. It will hopefully turn out well, but Wolfgang now has his hands full with composing, since he also has to compose the ballet⁵ which links the two acts or parts with each other. That Archduke Maximilian⁶ has become a cathedral canon [15] was nothing exceptional in my eyes: since my return from *Italy* I had already been saying everywhere in Salzburg that it would happen. The rest will also follow:⁷ just be patient! I regret that I cannot put everything in writing here. Salzburg is not the only goal in this first step! --- I hope you are well, and I do not doubt that Nannerl will continue to take her [20] herbal soups, for she has experienced how they help her. If Secretary Troger⁸ is still in Salzb:, give him a couple of boxes of the famous Spilman Hansl pillules⁹ to take with him. But if he has already departed, as I suspect, enquire diligently in the inns and at the post, for there will doubtless be various others travelling through Salzburg to Milan [25], and any one will take it with them; it is enough if you address it for delivery at His Excellency Count von Firmian's or al Illmo: Sgr: Padre: Collmo: il Sgr: Leopoldo Troger Secretario Reggio nello Stato della Lombardia à Milano. in Casa di S: Ecc: Il Sgr. Conte di Firmian.¹⁰

[30] These pillules are necessary for me, for I know that they are of service to me when, because of the constipations, my dizziness comes, and I have had this most of the time since my departure from Salzburg, but not so severely as to vomit or to be forced to lie in bed. Now that I have been taking the pillules for only 3 days, I notice that my head is getting lighter. But, unfortunately, I [35] have only 8 left. We kiss you both many 1000 000 times and I am as always your
