Milan, 28th *November*, 1772

[5] Today I received your letter² of the 20th safely. You want me to write a lot. But what am I to write? – that we are both well, praise God, is the most essential thing, and the best. There is nothing new here, and many of the people, yes, most of them, are still in the country, and they only come back to town towards Christmas when everything starts with the opening of the theatre. [10] Even the Archduke³ is out of town.⁴ As far as my headache is concerned, it only happens to me occasionally, and I sometimes notice the dizziness for some moments when I turn over in the night or raise myself up.

Otherwise I have a good *appetite*, and if I eat I am the healthiest of men. But we only eat once a day, which is at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. [15] At night we have an apple, a piece of bread and little glass of wine.⁵

I am writing from *Madame d'Asti's*, ⁶ who commends herself. *Msr. d'Asti* asks me to tell you that he is consternated that you do not send him a compliment as well, for I opened your previous letter there as well and read it out loud. Count *Sauerau's*⁷ becoming *Cathedral* Dean brought infinite joy to all of us. [20] We did not expect it, of course, because we did not think he would accept it. To music director *Lolli*⁸ I send, with my compliments, my thanks for the *Cecilia* money. ⁹ I had not expected it. It would have been enough for all of us that a poor soul from the monastery has been delivered. Things of this kind will now happen increasingly. ¹⁰ As far as the pieces of music are concerned, you acted correctly. [25] Our esteemed music director will certainly compose *symphonies*. I send thanks to all good friends, both gentlemen and ladies, for the kind good wishes ¹² and commend myself most obediently.

As far as the itinerant hunting horn player¹³ is concerned, I have already written to

him, a few days ago; our *compliments* to him. It is not cheap here. One must simply live accordingly. [30] We have to pay 36 kreuzers of our good money per head at midday, and thus 1 florin 12 current for two persons. On the other hand, we only eat once a day, but well. Today, *de Amicis*¹⁴ will set off from Venice and therefore be here in couple of days. Then work will really start properly; so far not much has happened. Wolfgang has written no more than the first *aria*¹⁵ for the *primo uomo*, ¹⁶ [35] but it is incomparable and he sings it like an angel. *Addio*, keep well. We kiss both of you many 100 000 times and I am as always your

MOZART'S POSTSCRIPT TO HIS SISTER:

Both of us send congratulations to Herr von *Amann*,¹⁸ and I wish to let him know that I am vexed that he has always made a big secret out of it whenever I have said anything to him about his esteemed bride.¹⁹ I thought he was more forthright. [40] I have to pass on compliments from Herr and Frau von *Germani*,²⁰ they are also sorry that they cannot be with you. One more thing: I would say to Herr von *Amann* that if he intends to have a proper wedding, then he should be kind enough to wait until we come back, so that what he promised me can come true, namely that I should dance at his wedding. [45] Keep well, my handkiss to Mama. To all good friends, both gentlemen and ladies, my compliments. ²¹<Say to Herr Leutgeb he should boldly come to Milan, for he would certainly do honour for his name, but soon>.²² Tell him this, I beg you, for it is important to me.
