0437. LEOPOLD MOZART TO BREITKOPF & SON, 1 LEIPZIG

Messrs. Breitkopf and Son / G [...]² / in / Leipzig

Salzburg, 13th March, 1778

Most noble, especially honourable gentlemen,

Since I have not seen any trace of either an answer to all my reminders [5] or, even less, the instruments requested from Herr Grenser in Dressden,³ I wished to collect the money for the 25 copies of the violin school⁴ from Herr Schwarzkopf⁵ at the present market⁶, as in your previous letter, but he offered his excuses, referring to your written instructions to him, saying that he had received no order. Accordingly, I wish to request, with all courtesy, [10] that a suitable order in my favour be sent as soon as possible by you personally, or by him, Herr Breitkopf. My son has left service in Salzburg and will now, when you read this, be in Paris. Here with us things look very sad, yet where does it not look critical now? — Our mutual friend,⁷ Herr von Grimm,⁸ but now Baron von Grimm, Ministre plenipotentiaire de Saxe=Gotha,⁹ [15] wrote to me last week from Paris, where he has arrived back from Russia. I commended my son to him. If I find I am in a position to carry out any services for you as a favour here, I would look forward with joy to such a desired opportunity to be able to show in deeds that I am, with the most particular respect, Your noble Worships'

The latter was also declared universal heir by Breitkopf shortly before his death in 1800.
