<u>Vienne</u> ce 10 d'avril 1784.

Mon trés cher Pére!1

I beg you, do not on any account be angry with me for not having written to you for so long; – indeed you know how much I had to do here at this time! – [5] with my 3 subscription concerts² I have gained a great deal of honour to my name. – My concert in the theatre turned out very well too. – I have written 2 grand concertos,³ and then a quintet,⁴ which has received exceptional applause; – personally I consider it the best that I have written in my whole life. – it consists of 1 oboe, 1 Clarinetto, 1 Corno, 1 fagotto, and the piano forte; [10] – I would have wished you could have heard it! – and how beautifully it was performed! – By the way |: to confess the truth: I have become tired recently - from nothing but playing. - and it is no small honour for me that this never happened to my audience. – Now I have a task for you: old Baron du Pain⁵ |: who owns every possible kind of beautiful and also bad music: [15] would like to have the following rondò and duetto by Gatti. 6 – Recit: vo Ah! non sdegnarti o <u>cara. – Rondò. Nel lasciarti in questo istante. – Duetto</u>. Ne' giorni tuoi felici etc: I would therefore be greatly obliged to you if you could *procure* these 2 pieces for me as soon as possible. – I will make sure of paying for the *copies* via Herr Peisser. ⁷ [20] Today I have now finished a yet another new concerto for Fräulein Ployer;8 [20] and now I am already half dressed to go to Prince Kaunitz.9 – yesterday I played at Leopold Palfy's.10 – tomorrow at the concert which Mad:elle Bayer¹¹ is giving. – Now another thing; – when Hafeneder¹² died, Herr von Ployer¹³ was given the task of looking for a *violinist*. – [25] I confidentially *recommended* to him a certain Menzl – a handsome, young, skilled person. – But forbade him to make any mention of me, otherwise it might not go through. - he is now waiting for the decree. - I believe he will receive 400 florins – and a suit – I have already upbraided *Menzl* regarding the suit – for it is beggarly. – [30] should anything come of it, I will give Menzl a letter for you to take with him, as well as the *musique*; – and then you will find in him an orderly *violinist* who can also play thoroughly well at sight; – no-one in Vienna has played my quartets so well \dot{a} vista¹⁴ as he has. – and he is the best fellow in the world, who will take pleasure in making musique in your home as often as you wish. – [35] I also included him in the orchestra for my concerts. - Now I must close; my wife and I kiss your hands 1000 times and embrace our dear sister from the heart and are, sir, eternally your
