Now that Herr Egedacher² had made his arrangements, but the Graz messenger³ could not take him with him, he has in God's name found someone to take him as far as Hof⁴ for 1 florins 15 kreuzers⁵ and in which he has to buy the horse's fodder and give the fellow a tip. [5] As to whether he will now go on foot from Hof⁶ or will give the innkeeper in Hof 48 kreuzers to drive him all the way to St. Gilgen, or whether the innkeeper is willing or able to drive him, I do not know. Yet it is accursedly sad that there are so many complications and expenses on the way out there. – If you arrange for Herr Egedacher to be driven into town, [10] the lackey will no doubt call on me. But it perhaps might cost less if your innkeeper drives him only as far as Hof, – and if the innkeeper in Hof drives him as far as the city gate for 48 kreuzers. Enough! I don't know. I kiss all of you from the heart and am, whether tardy or in haste, as always your sincere

[15] I have just this moment received 10 lines from your brother, where he writes that his first *subscription concert*⁸ begins on the 11th February and *continues* every Friday; that in the third week of Lent he is sure of getting a day for Heinrich's⁹ *concert* in the theatre; that I should come soon; – that last Saturday he let his dear friend Haydn and other good friends hear his 6 quartets, ¹⁰ which he sold to *Artaria* for 100 *ducats*. ¹¹ [20] At the end he writes: Now I will again get down to the *concerto* I have begun. *Adieu*!

The messenger is bringing a *concerto*¹² with him and the little shoes for Karl¹³ price 36 kreuzers. I paid the boot polisher 12 kreuzers and Hubernannerl¹⁴ 6 kreuzers for washing the small pieces of cloth.
