We arrived here yesterday at 12 o'clock midday, I found your letter, and am letting you know that I intend to arrive in Salzburg on the evening of the 13<sup>th</sup>, the Friday before Pentecost, at the latest, at which point I will then probably or surely run into you both,<sup>4</sup> [5] or certainly hope to see you on Saturday. I am well, praise God, although I always had a severe cough in Lintz, which the raw air on the journey gave me. – The two of you could have saved your *compliments* regarding the permission to stay in my house, since you know that it gives me the greatest pleasure to see you there; [10] and you, madame daughter, know how little I like *compliments*. I will write to the esteemed paymaster<sup>5</sup> today about the salary, and he will furthermore let Tresel<sup>6</sup> know about our arrival. I kiss my esteemed son and yourself from the heart – give my greetings to the children and I am your sincere
