Salzb., 29th [December,] <u>1785</u>.

Leopoldl² is in good health, praise God, and, along with myself and our entire royal household of Nandl³ and Tresel, wishes all of you a happy and blessed New Year.

[5] After the constant deterioration of the health of the esteemed former Mayor Weiser,⁵ the multiplication of his pains from sand and stones, the swelling of his legs and his breathing becoming difficult, he finally entered eternity around 8 o'clock on the evening of the 26th. At this very moment of writing, I have just come from his burial, which was well enough attended. [10] His instructions were for only <u>one church service</u>, which will be on <u>Saturday</u>, and 3 brotherhoods with the orphanage children formed the *normal* cortège.

Yesterday, the 28th, at 8 o'clock in the morning, the esteemed prelate⁶ of blessed memory was buried. He too had to be carried to the grave with only the standard 4 brotherhoods -N.B. without guilds, - and without orphans. [15] The *university* and students were of course there. The esteemed Prelate of Michaelbayern⁷ conducted the burial and Canon Professor Klaymayr⁸ gave the funeral sermon. Bishops, canons, gentlemen of the court and others etc. went along in naturalibus⁹ etc. One can easily imagine the size of the crowd. I saw it from Catherl Gilowsky's¹⁰ place, and then went immediately to the choir loft at St. Peter's¹¹ to avoid the crush, [20] where the sermon took its due course, and after the sermon the requiem, and I was the unplanned conductor, but Haydn¹² played the organ. After the sung Mass came the lowering into the crypt. The Archbishop¹³ came at the beginning of the sung Mass and stayed, to everyone's amazement, to the very end of the lowering into the crypt, [25] which passed over the steps in the straightest of lines immediately before his eyes. The function did not finish until half past 11. In the evening I was in the Kapellhaus, 14 where, besides the <u>Consistory Director</u>, ¹⁵ – <u>Racher</u>, <u>Daller</u>, the Master of the Mint, – the <u>university</u> prefect and other habitual gluttons, the esteemed brother of the esteemed prefect, the esteemed Prelate of Michaelbayern was a guest. – The Sauter boy, my pupil, played a violin concerto,

- [30] I reached my house door on the stroke of 11 o'clock, today I heard that at 1 o'clock they still had not finished for the night.

The woman¹⁷ has just brought me <u>everything</u>. I thank you for the <u>sausage</u>, and for the rabbit, and the 2 servants kiss your hands for the New Year money you sent and say <u>may God reward you</u>. I will bring the sausages to the Eberlins' Waberl¹⁸ straight away before the day is out, [30] unless the esteemed paymaster, who sent a message that he would come to see me at 6 o'clock, holds me up.

Frau von Hermes¹⁹ asked for 100 *bout*.,²⁰ – she told me she wanted to send me a *bout*. as a sample, – she still has not sent it, so I will send Tresel to collect it.

[40] The idea that the Archbishop also wants to be prelate of St. Peter's may well have occurred to someone who claims to have seen this possibility in the earliest days, – to a schemer, – but here really not a soul was thinking that! And the Prince²¹ himself said this to the prior, who announced the prelate's death to him that very evening, that is, at once: – <u>I</u> have lost a worthy man and friend, [45] and I hope you will elect a worthy man again soon. Meanwhile, the rumours about *Father Dominicus*²² have not diminished, but multiplied. Here and there, only one or 2 at most are being mentioned, but *Father Dominicus* is always the favourite. I am curious about the election. In 5 weeks at the most, perhaps earlier, our curiosity will be satisfied. [50]

Despite his rash, which he has only on his face, on his <u>head</u>, in his <u>ears</u> and, because of touching his face, on his fingers, Leopoldl is in good spirits and form, – he usually shits and pisses while sitting on a pretty chamber pot, and can often <u>laugh</u> and <u>chat</u> quite appallingly. [55] When a stranger comes into the room, he inspects him from head to toe. Herr von *D'yppold*²³ calls on him from time to time, and recently he came in *uniform*, which particularly attracted his eye, with the result that he was in the best of humours and always wanted to chat with him: that touched *D'Jppold* so much that he was constantly kissing the child's little hand, [60] commended the child to Nandl quite astonishingly and gave her 24 kreuzers on his departure.

The Bavarians have gone through a time of great alarm because great numbers of troops arrived near Munich, Ampfing, Anzing, Ötting and advanced through Bavaria in dispersed *columns* towards *Braunau* and into the Innviertl.²⁴ – They came from the Netherlands. [65] That is why our Colonel is in Milldorf²⁵ to organise *victuals*, stabling etc., and all the provisions for the dragoons taking a rest day there; the first division of them will already be here on the 31st. The Bavarians were already convinced they wanted to occupy land because of the exchange of territory.²⁶

With this I am sending books and the bag. I gave the Hubers' Nannerl²⁷ <u>16 kreuzers</u>, 12 kreuzers for the silk, and as she did not want to take anything for her work, I gave her 4 kreuzers on top of that.

Today is the last church service for the esteemed prelate. –

Yesterday, the <u>Lodrons' childrens' nurse Mariandl</u> died. – The widow of the barber Lidl has also passed into eternity, so her sister, <u>Wenzl Hebelt's wife</u>, ²⁸ [75] is freed of her burden all at once and can visit the esteemed parish priest Seiser in summer again after all and save her gratuity²⁹ for a few months.

Did I perhaps write to say that the bass Stängel, who lives in the Griesbader house, exchanged promises with that white-haired little poodle, the daughter of the barber Müntz, and she was therefore taken to the Ursulines for a week for safe keeping? [80] —— She is back in town again, but I do not know how they settled the matter. They have probably had to retract their promises to each other. But he is still living in the house.

During this time I have yet to receive a letter from your brother. Herr Norman wrote to *Brunetti*³¹ saying that <u>Herr Fiala</u>³² is <u>lodging at Wolfgang's</u> [85] and that Norman made a <u>profit of 95 ducats</u>³³ from a *concert* and also has hopes of playing at the Emperor's³⁴ banquet on New Year's Day |: the only day with music at table :|. But that would be <u>50 ducats</u> again, the customary present. –

Herr von *Berhansky*³⁵ and *M:lle* Waberl³⁶ thank you most astonishingly for the sausages, [90] which I still managed to bring to them yesterday, at 7 o'clock in the evening, and they also wish a happy New Year until opportunity allows them to thank you in person. Frau Strasser³⁷ has also had bonnets made for her little boy like those I had made for Leopoldl, I had to send a one as a pattern. These are sleeping bonnets, like those we all have, without laces, since I [...]³⁸ laces, which cut into and strangle children when they constantly turn their heads to and fro. [95]

Now I kiss <u>both of you</u> from the heart, repeat my New Year's wish, send greetings to the children and am eternally your sincere father

When they said yesterday, on hearing the "Little Throes-Bell", ⁴⁰ that it was for an old childrens' nurse, [100] no-one knew of anyone except the 2 servants, either Nandl or Traudl. ⁴¹ And I still do not know which of them it is, because this morning some were saying it was Traudl.
