The *musique* requested⁴ will leave here tomorrow by post-coach, - [5] you will find the amount payable for the *copies* at the end of the letter. – It is quite natural for some of my pieces to be sent to foreign countries – but these are pieces which I intentionally allow to reach the world – and I only sent you the themes of them because it was possible, after all, that they had not reached you, but the pieces which I reserve for myself, [10] or for a small circle of music lovers and connoisseurs |: with the promise that they will not let them out of their hands : | cannot possibly be known outside this country because they are not even known here; - this is so with the 3 concertos which I have the honour of sending to His Illustriousness;⁵ in this case I saw myself obliged to set a small *honorarium*, besides the costs of the *copies*, of 6 *ducats*⁶ for each *concerto*, [15] while I must at the same time beg His I. not to let the *concertos* in question out of his hands. – the *Concerto in A*⁷ includes 2 *clarinetti*. – Should you not have these instruments at your court, a skilful *copvist* should transpose them into the required key, in which case the first should be played on a *violin* and the second on a viola. - [20] As far as the proposal⁸ which I took the liberty of sending to your worthy prince is concerned, the first thing I require to know is the genre of composition which H. I. can best use and most requires, and how much of each genre you desire to have from me; I would wish to know this exactly so as to be able to make my *calculation*. - [25] I ask you to caste me at the feet of H. I. and to make my wish known to His Most Elevated Person.⁹ – and now, dearest friend! - companion of my youth! - Since I have of course often been in Ricken¹⁰ during these many years, and yet never had the pleasure of meeting you there, my greatest wish would in fact be that you could visit me in Vienna, or that I visit you in Donaueschingen. [30] - I would almost prefer, forgive me, the latter! - since, besides the pleasure of embracing you, I would also be so favoured as to offer my services to your most gracious Prince¹¹ and to remind myself even more vividly of the many favours which I enjoyed at your court in my earlier years,¹² favours which I shall never forget as long as I live.

Answered the 8th of September inst. and sent the same day with the stated amount of 119 fl. 39 kr. in Kaiser's money – with 143¹/₂ fl. Imperial money sent post-free.

These $143\frac{1}{2}$ fl. have been drawn from the Royal payment office according to most gracious command and instruction. As the note delivered to the esteemed Royal Paymaster indicates the remaining details. S. Winter." ³ = "To Monsieur Sebastien Winter, Personal Valet to His Serene Highness the Prince of Fürstenberg etc. etc. in Donaueschingen".
