[She has not succeeded in obtaining the desired sonatas with the themes sent to her;<sup>5</sup> in the judgement of experts and music lovers, these do not seem to be Mozart's work at all. [5] Only one of the themes points to a Mozart sonata,<sup>6</sup> but it was never finished or printed (information provided by Mozart's widow). She also mentions plagiarism from her brother's work committed by Förster.<sup>7</sup> The painter is already in the process of copying her brother's likeness from the large family portrait.<sup>8</sup>]
