Since the glass-carrier woman² is leaving punctually at 9 o'clock again, I am writing only a few words. – I am sending the 2nd and 3rd volumes³ back to you [5] and would have wished that you had sent the 5th straight away along with the 4th, since the books were so well protected between the cloths and I am of course responsible for them. Heinrich⁴ commends himself to both of you and expresses his thanks and obligation.

Baron Peterman,⁵ the young Count Wallis,⁶ Angerbaur,⁷ and the chamber calefactor Gallus arrived yesterday morning via Lauffen⁸ as the *avant-garde*.⁹ [10] Since on Monday, namely the night before, there was a severe thunderstorm in the locality between Lauffen and Tittmoning¹⁰ which we here heard and saw in the distance until 10 and 11 at night; accordingly, they stayed the night with a farmer in Löbenau.¹¹ Count Wallis and spouse stayed in Augspurg to see the air balloon,¹² but the Archbishop will not go to either Augsp. or Munich, but will take a side road.¹³ [15] It is certain that a great discussion took place among the bishops of Germany regarding the Papal Nunciature.

The wife of the former chief administrator¹⁴ in Lauffen, Vögele, has died, as you will perhaps already know.

A certain theatre director, Felder,¹⁵ who was here just now, [20] has received the sought-after permission for this winter. No *operettas*; – no *ballets*; – God knows what his abilities are or what kind of people he has.

The play by the miscellaneous amateurs is being rehearsed constantly, and all the more assiduously because they had already rehearsed one twice, and are now preparing a different one again because 2 persons who could no longer keep up with it have left, [25] namely the

handsome royal *confectioner*, Herr *Glitsch*,¹⁶ and a merchant's servant. They will perform 2 *plays* together.

Herr Bauernfeind of the pawn office has taken such a strong, clownish notion to perform a *play* on St. Jerome's Day¹⁷ that he is almost trampling my house down with *melodramas* and *plays* in order to get his young Regerl and Frau Steiger¹⁸ on stage. [30] But the latter has already refused. He wants Heinrich to take a role, and he, in the manner you know of him, immediately steps up boldly without thinking about whether it pleases or displeases his father etc. etc. There would be plenty to say about this and the consequences arising from it.

Little Leopold¹⁹ is well, and yesterday, after so many pressing requests from Frau von Schiedenhoffen,²⁰ I had him carried to her, where he played with the children in such a delightfully entertaining way that they were there for over 2 hours. They commend themselves!

Nandl²¹ and Tresel²² kiss your hands. I kiss both of you from the heart, send my greetings to the children and am as always your sincere father

[40] Your brother commends himself to both of you and writes to say that his wife will soon give birth.²⁴

*Bologna*²⁵ set off for Munich on Monday evening in his *chaise* with the *ordinari*,²⁶ so went through a fair part of the thunderstorm, since he will have been somewhere close to Waging²⁷ at 9 o'clock, [45] will therefore probably have waited in Waging for the thunderstorm to pass. Here they took every precaution to make sure he did not get close to young Regerl, daughter of the Senior Equerry,²⁸ far less speak to her; he organised a concert at *Barisani's*, to which, however, not a soul from the households of Schiedenhofen or the Senior Equerry came; he sang 2 rondeaux, a *duet* with Haydn's wife,²⁹ [50] and a *trio* with her and *Tomaselli*,³⁰ otherwise nothing was performed except 3 *symphonies*; the rest in person in due time. There are also great dealings between *Bologna* and *Gatti*,³¹ since the latter, at

Bologna's written request, sent the whole *opera Olympiade*³² to Vienna and now *Bologna*, on the occasions where he has met *Gatti* on the street, [55] has not said even a word about the *opera*, not said thank you, and even less has he thought about a present in return, which he promised in writing.
