Dear Herr André

[Vienna, 15<sup>th</sup> January, 1800]

At the end of the Hanauer Zeitung No. 2 of 4<sup>th</sup> Jan., 1800, someone is looking for a young person in the mercantile field. He should have the following characteristics:

[5] He must be between 14 and 16 years old, possessed of an upright heart, be able to write and count tolerably. These characteristics, partly to a greater extent and in one case to a much higher degree, are united in my elder son.<sup>3</sup> (His age is that specified). He speaks some French, although admittedly little, he has also made <u>no more</u> than a start in English and Italian, [10] he has also long frequented Latin schools. I would like, with which he agrees, to make a merchant of him. Would you do me the friendly favour of finding out the trading company in question? Would I be dealing with a man of reputation and integrity? Would the young man, as in the advertisement, learn a great deal without cost, and what would this be? [15] What, quite generally, is it important for me to know, and what are all the conditions? Do you wish that I should write to the man myself afterwards, or he to me – or do you even wish to take the negotiations on yourself – I expect to learn this from your kind answer.

He was the third son of Johann André (1741-1799), composer, music director (from 1766), founded the music publishing business in Offenbach in 1784. It was thus in Johann Anton's first year as a publisher that the contract was concluded with Constanze (8<sup>th</sup> November, 1799) regarding the music in Mozart's estate. His full title in 1826 was "Music Director to the Grand Prince of Hessen and Court Councillor at the Princely Court in Isenburg" ["grossfürstlich hessischer Kapellmeister und fürstlich Isenburgischer Hofrath"].

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> BD: Carl Thomas, born on 21<sup>st</sup> September, 1784. He attended a grammar school while staying with Franz Niemetschek in Prague, returning to Vienna in 1797. Without completing grammar school studies, he joined a trading firm in Livorno, but Constanze, strangely enough, does not mention this. The enquiries in Hanau did not lead to employment, cf. No. 1285/33-37.
