Most nobly born!
Most estimable sir!

St. Gilgen, 28<sup>th</sup> *August*, 1800.

I hasten to inform you that I did not receive your communication of 15<sup>th</sup> *June*, 4 with the enclosed sum of 12 ducats, 5 until the 23<sup>rd</sup> *August*, and with it that of 1<sup>st</sup> *August*. 6 Above all, I most heartily regret what was for me the most unexpected demise of Herr Breitkopf: 7 although he was personally unknown to me, his praises were already long known to me from the written and spoken words of others.

I will write to Salzburg before the end of today [10] to arrange the copying of the pieces<sup>8</sup> whose themes you have sent me. I will give one of my friends the task of taking care of it, ensuring everything is copied, as far as possible, without error, and I hope my instructions will be carried out precisely. I am sending you herewith the score of the *opera La giardiniera*.<sup>9</sup> If you can make use of it, you do not need to have it copied [15] since I am handing it over to you in its present state. Although it is only a *copy* of the score by my blessedly departed brother, which his widow must now however have in her hands, I do nevertheless vouch for its authenticity. In my brother's score the text is Italian, but here it is translated into German.

As soon as I can, I will send you the thematic catalogue<sup>10</sup> of all of my brother's compositions, which is in my keeping. [20] It will then be my pleasure, if I have anything else which you do not possess, to send it on to you. I hope for a soon forthcoming and definite reply to my letter and to receive the 5 *copies* of The Creation by Herr Haidn<sup>11</sup> requested there. [25] I shall then immediately and gratefully transfer the payment for it or in the meanwhile receive it back when accounts are settled. I remain, with the greatest respect,
