[Salzburg, 28<sup>th</sup> February, 1802]

. . . I am sending you herewith the opening bars<sup>5</sup> from the symphonies, masses and other pieces which can be found at the Prince's court<sup>6</sup> . . . As Carnival is now coming to an end, I will try again, because the people have now celebrated to exhaustion, [5] to discover some compositions by my brother; in particular, I will try to speak to the esteemed music director<sup>7</sup> about whether he can perhaps obtain those operas which he claims are no longer at court; of course, nothing will happen there without a present. – There is still uncertainty as to whether Herr Michel Haydn<sup>8</sup> is going to Vienna or not, [10] and the few in Salzburg who are knowledgeable about music would have course be very sorry if we lost him; besides that, to the shame of Salzburg, the artists who are born here or have already been here a long time are easily forgotten...
